1 Mission Statement

- Supplement the classroom learning with opportunities for **experiential learning** in which students apply key concepts to relevant contemporary problems.
- Introduce students to government and policy practitioners and help them to build familiarity and **relationships** relevant to future careers.

3 Events

The only mandatory event of the spring 2023 semester is the Welcome Back Dinner on January 27; however, Democracy Lab students are expected to participate regularly in learning community activities. There are two types of activities: Recurring and Special.

3.1 Recurring Events

3.1.1 GOV 319 – Election Analysis (M/W noon)

This special topics course is a continuation of the Voter Turnout Experiment from fall semester. In this class, students will learn state-of-the-art analytical techniques for analyzing the data DL students collected during the 2022 Midterm Election. The class will also expose students to the latest political science literature and findings regarding voter turnout. The class is open to *any* Democracy Lab student, regardless of participation in the fall Voter Turnout Experiment. **Registration required.**
